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Shae Jonsson

Shae Jonsson is a physiotherapist working in Atherton, a recipient of a bursary and session facilitator during the recent Joint Rural Health Club Weekend.

Shae graduated from James Cook University in Townsville in 2013 with a Bachelor of Physiotherapy and worked for just over 2 years in a small private practice in Townsville, before relocating back home to the Atherton Tablelands in 2016. In 2018 she opened Healthwise Physio in Atherton in a partnership.

I really enjoy being a generalist physio however have expanded into fields of vestibular rehabilitation and women's health to try and better accommodate the community. I love the close-knit feel of the community and the beauty of rural life.

Shae was a successful recipient of a bursary through our Health Workforce Scholarship Program and has received over \$8,000 for professional development courses!

"The course I applied for is from Canadian physiotherapist, Dianne Lee, who has developed an Integrated Systems Model, which is a framework to help practitioners organise their knowledge and provide the best possible treatment for the patient."

This framework teaches practitioners how to treat patients holistically and help practitioners treat patients with more complex presentations. It enables practitioners to find a primary 'driver' for their patient's pain/ symptoms and can be applied to most conditions.

The Clinical Mentorship in the Integrated Systems Model course will take place in Canberra and consists of three five-day intensive face-to-face sessions; the first session took place in late November.

"Without the bursary there is no way I would be able to attend this course – given the three lots of travel to Canberra and accommodation, plus the cost of the course itself."

The Health Workforce Scholarship Program has also provided benefits to Healthwise Physio as a business. The physiotherapists at Healthwise Physio have had the opportunity to partake in a lot more professional development, which means they are continuing to upskill and provide more updated, evidence-based treatment for the community.

"I love working in rural North Queensland as it means we are exposed to such a variety of different conditions and caseloads, from infants to the elderly."

From her professional and personal experiences, Shae is passing on her knowledge and insight to health students interested in rural practice. She facilitated the allied health session during the recent Joint Rural Health Club Weekend in Atherton; an event which gives students a brief yet jam-packed immersion into rural practice. A key aspect that makes JRHCW an engaging event, is the involvement of local health practitioners.

"It was a pleasure to be asked alongside local GP's to help facilitate a JRHCW session. It was great to see so many students keen to explore rural medicine and allied health. I think it was great to have the different disciplines participate in the allied health session to gain a better understanding of what other health professionals do."

Five RLRP Doctors Achieve Fellowship

Medical practitioners on the Rural Locum Relief Program (RLRP) are able to access a Medicare provider number whilst they work towards Fellowship.

Health Workforce Queensland manages the RLRP in Queensland and supports RLRP candidates on their long and complex journey of achieving Fellowship.

On 6 April 2019, seven doctors on the RLRP attended a preparation workshop for the Objective Structured Clinical Exam (OSCE). The OSCE is the final exam before achieving Fellowship!

Health Workforce Queensland worked with AOGP to fund the April Mock OSCE workshop. The Mock OSCE provides attendees with practical tools, strategies and systems to manage cases and exam time. In September, the seven attendees undertook the final OSCE.
